#### SENATOR PAULINE EISENSTADT'S BILL SB155

As we all know, SB155 was tabled in the House Education Committee (6-5) after passing the State Senate. We have heard from a committee member that a representative voted to table the bill as a result of a misunderstanding. Had he switched his vote, the bill would have passed. We have also heard that Governor Johnson intended to sign the bill if it reached him. Regardless, SB155 came very close to passing. If we are not successful in pursuing the current course with the State Board of Education, we can consider reintroducing the bill in a future session. Let's hope that won't be necessary.

## DEMOCRATIC PARTY RESOLUTION

On April 22, 1997, the Democratic Party of Bernalillo County passed a series of resolutions. Resolution 2a states:

"2a. WHEREAS, there is no requirement for New Mexico school teachers to present evolution as the scientifically accepted explanation of the development of earth's life forms as part of the curriculum, and "WHEREAS, school children lacking such instruction will be at a disadvantage relative to others receiving such instruction in terms of college entrance requirements, job opportunities, and ability to make informed judgments,

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the State Board of Education be directed by statute to require the teaching of evolution in science classes."

The passed resolutions next go to the state Democratic party.
